GROUP 2 – ENGLISH B

NATURE OF THE SUBJECT

The English B course is designed to continue language acquisition and skill development as well as intercultural understanding so that students can communicate successively in an environment where English is used. This involves not only linguistic but sociolinguistic, pragmatic and intercultural competencies. To this end, various educational experiences are offered, focusing on three core areas: communication and media, social relationships and global issues. Students are encouraged in both independent and collaborative learning within the core and five options: cultural diversity, customs and traditions, health, leisure, science and technology. Literature is also studied at high level offering further depth and appreciation of the target language.
