PRIMARY ACTIVITIES

PYP1 AND PYP2 - MATHS

Talking about the mafia, their effects on everyday life and the fight against injustice, we understood that even the littlest ones can contribute to change. MYP2 - BERGEGGI



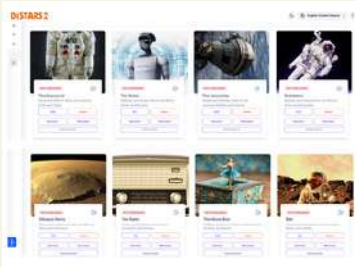
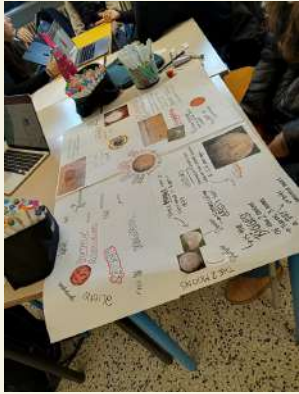
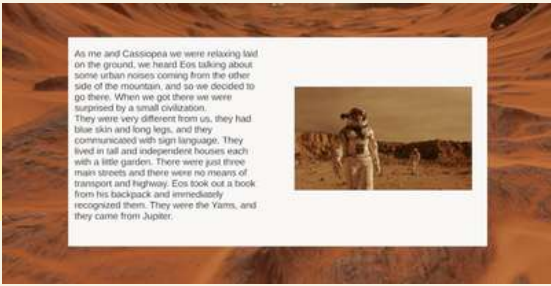

Focus on CAS

On Saturday 25th January, despite the rain, students from MYP4 and 5 kept their spirits high, asking passers-by in Via XX, politely and respectfully, to help sufferers of leprosy by helping the association CALAM in their fund-raising campaign.

All three teachers, Damonte, Nespola and Ebury, noted just how polite and positive our students were and how well they represented their school and their mission for the day. A grand total of 561 Euros was collected, even if the weather wasn't too good. MYP 4 won the inter-class fund-raising contest, again! (307 versus 254 euro, as counted by MYP1 Red)

Emma Parodi, a MYP4 student, shared an interesting and instructive reflection on her experience:

What is leprosy? What are its causes? How many cases of leprosy are there in the world?

Leprosy is an infectious disease caused by Mycobacterium leprae and it is transmitted by cough droplets from mouth to mouth. It can cause development of disabilities, unpleasant rashes and also can be crippling in daily life. There are still many cases in places like Africa and South America and most people with leprosy are often neglected in society as there is no vaccine.

Is it the duty of relatively rich countries to help people from less fortunate countries? Why?

I think it is the duty of relatively rich countries to help people from less fortunate countries because most of these less fortunate countries were colonized by richer countries and I believe they do deserve credit or help from our countries as it isn't their fault. Also caring about others makes a person open-minded and I believe it is one of the best traits to acquire.

Is collecting money different from donating? Why?

I believe giving a donation normally comes from one singular person. Donating normally consists of one person giving quite a large quantity of money, meanwhile, collecting money consists of multiple people offering a smaller amount to create a whole. I believe collecting money can also unite people to help others. Raise awareness.

What were people's reactions? What have you learnt about people?

Most people were very kind and respectful. Lots of old ladies complemented our school and our work, often giving us some donations. Most people just walked past staring weirdly at me, it wasn't pleasant but I knew it was for a good cause.

Did you feel involved? Embarrassed? Proud? Did you learn something about yourself?

I did feel involved, I knew what I was doing was for a good cause and that made me happy. I did sometimes feel a little scared when the teacher left us to check on the others. I only felt embarrassed when a group of teenage girls snickered at me when they walked past. I learnt that with a little courage I overcame my fear of asking strangers questions!

Would you do something differently next time?

Yes I would change something, in fact I have already spoken to Prof. Ebury about it. I often go busking with my twin sister Giulia; we are a singing duo, and we have permission from the SIAE, so we are covered. Often we do make quite a bit of money and we hope that one day we could raise money for charity like the Calam day!
