- The class representative represents all students, not only close friends, with fairness and justice (IB: Principled).
- The class representative communicates clearly and respectfully the decisions to classmates (IB: Communicator).
- The class representative collaborates with teachers and classmates to build a positive environment (IB: Caring).
- The class representative gives a good example by respecting rules and encouraging others to do the same (IB: Balanced).
- The class representative helps solve conflicts with calm and listens (IB: Reflective).
- The class representative commits actively to making the school a better place (IB: Risk-taker).



SUCCESSI DIS



After the selection at the national Science on Stage competition in Roveredo which featured thirty creative entries from schools all over Italy, two projects from DIS have qualified for the Science on Stage European finals, which will take place in Lithuania in May 2026.

"Different, adaptable or just normal?" is a DIS project that examined diversity from a biological and mathematical perspective. Students studied genetic variation as a major force behind the evolution of species in biology under the teachings of Monica Stauder and Blu Maniscalco. In maths, the same concepts have been investigated through the use of probability theory and the normal distribution. The aim was to encourage critical thinking around the idea of "normality" and to highlight diversity, both in nature and in society, as a vital strength. The other project titled "An InTERdisciplinary experience to explore career opportunities in STEAM", was inspired by a visit to the ITER nuclear fusion research center. The project involved lower secondary students in an interdisciplinary journey that combined physics, sustainability, foreign languages, and career orientation. Teachers Chiara Colucci, Alberto Conte, Blu Maniscalco, and Tania Rondanina led the students through an exploration of both scientific concepts and professional opportunities in the STEAM fields.

FOCUS ON CAS - SUMMER SERVICE

DISTRIBUTING AID PACKAGES IN CUBA



During the summer, Service projects don't stop and one of our DP1 students, now DP2, Jeremy Nielsen, organized and delivered aid to those in need in Cuba. He recently told us about his experience:

"Originally, I decided to travel to Cuba and do this activity because I had seen initiatives from the Vietnamese government that were sending aid to Cuba, and I started to learn about the prevalent issues Cuba is facing currently. I also started to get very interested in Cuban culture, so after a lot of research I decided to plan this excursion. The process of organising the distribution was fairly straightforward, as my family has ties to people in Cuba, and they were able to point me in the right direction of someone who could be trusted to properly redistribute the aid we were going to bring. [...]

I and my travel partner encountered our biggest problem, organising transportation. We were recommended against taking buses or trains, as they can be slow, inconsistent and can leave you stranded. That left us with the only option of taking a taxi, but we were covering long distances and did not have enough money to pay for such distant taxi rides. Plus the taxi systems are old school, no ride hailing and since we had no connection it was difficult to call for one. Everything was also entirely paid for in cash, which added yet another layer to the difficulty, because cash exchange in Cuba can be risky. There is also nowhere you can go to withdraw cash, so we had to budget what we had meticulously otherwise we risked ending up truly stranded. This was probably one of the most difficult organisational aspects of this experience, because it is difficult to keep track of the amount of money you are spending and what you need if you do not really have a sense of the value of the currency. Other than these difficulties, the plan went very smoothly, I was able to hand over everything without problems, and it has since been confirmed to me that some of the things I brought have already been handed over to families and individuals in need. [...]

One of the biggest challenges I faced in distributing the aid was the language barrier, but I was able to overcome it thanks to my background in IB Spanish. It was also difficult to make contact with the people, as foreign sim cards do not work, and very few places have wifi. On top of that, after a certain hour the power to the city cuts off as part of countrywide rolling blackouts, meaning I had to carefully plan my movements to make sure my phone did not run out of power as it would become much more difficult to return to our lodging. Another significant challenge was when in the course of the trip, my travel partner fell very ill with a kidney infection, that required hospitalisation for two days, where we faced shortages of clean drinking water and food, and I had to repeatedly leave the hospital to bring back bottled water. The experience made me reflect on how fortunate I am to have all the medicines, toiletries, etc, as I need, and reminded me not to take these things for granted. " (J. Nielsen)

DP HISTORY

Thanks to Prof. Rolla, over the summer students who picked DP History have had the chance to do some CAS hours with research centres and researchers around the world.

"M. Battolla, P. Marvulli, A. Cavalleroni and S. Ronci have completed a collaboration with ACLED (Armed Conflict Location & Event Data) which is an independent global monitor based in London that collects, analyses, and maps data on conflict and protest. A. Cavalleroni and S. Ronci have then collaborated with an anthropologist from University of Genova to study the life of Palestinian refugees who live in Cairo today. Finally, E. Trillo has helped an UN researcher based in Nairobi to study patterns of migration in Central America. This year they will also all do archival work in several national archives in Genova, along with participating to two conferences on Geopolitics (Limes) and History (La Storia in Piazza). Following the interdisciplinary tradition of the Annales School, historians today are trained as political scientists, economists, anthropologists and more. DP History preps you up for that." (Prof. Rolla and Lorenzetti)

Students involved shared their reflections on the experience:

"This summer I had the opportunity of helping senior analysts who work at ACLED, a website occupied with tracking and reporting every single protest, conflict, war on the globe. Our boss, Tiziano Breda, senior analyst on Latin America and the Caribbean at ACLED, explained into detail what we had to complete and do. Our task entailed building a tracker of emergency measures that several Latin American and Caribbean countries have been imposing in recent years as a means to tackle violent crime. For this endeavour, they had developed some guidelines and crafted an Excel template to be used by students in their submissions. We were a group of 5 students working on this, which meant that we had to collaborate extensively regarding the sharing of progress and research. It was definitely very interesting to work on this task for these people because we got to research in depth Latin American countries provided to us about state of emergencies. Furthermore, after completing this internship, I got to speak to the MYP5, and talk to them regarding this opportunity so that people who are interested can evaluate what they want to do for CAS already. I had the pleasure to share my experience with other kids and hope that my feedback might be helpful to them." (A. Cavalleroni)

"During summer break, some classmates and I worked with the ACLED organisation to track the use of emergency measures in Latin America and the Caribbean. Each of us was responsible for the documentation of the imposition of these emergency measures in one or more subregions in a given year. For instance, my task was to track all the emergency states in Haiti, Ecuador and Colombia from 2018 to 2025, and record them in reverse chronological order on Excel. We had one week each to complete the exercise.

Finding reliable information on Haiti was challenging. Most of the official states of emergency were linked to the same singular initial event: a prison break of gang members. For the research, I have used government websites, gazettes, and press releases. Most of the time, I looked into local language sources. It was an insightful and interesting activity that helped me develop my research and critical analysis skills." (M. Battolla)

MYP2 - ENGLISH AND VISUAL ARTS

MYP2 students worked on an interdisciplinary didactic unit (IDU) in MYP1 which connected Art and English, using modal verbs like “ought to” “should” and “have to” to give an understanding into why certain procedures need doing in order to do a good job; in this case, painting a park bench for our local community.

PRIMARY ACTIVITIES


OPEN HOUSE PRIMARY

Their stories helped us understand the importance of everyone's participation in building a more just society. EOES 2026

The competition begins with a school-level experimental phase, where teams of three students (one for Physics, one for Chemistry, and one for Biology) will carry out three experiments on December 9th, starting at 8:30 a.m. and lasting four hours.

The best team from our school will advance to the next theoretical round, which will select the 11 top Italian teams. These teams will then be invited to Padova from February 11th to 13th (during the winter break) for the National Final, where the two teams that will represent Italy in the European Final will be chosen.

The Experimental Science Olympiad is an international competition that offers a valuable experience and can greatly enhance your academic profile, especially for university applications abroad.
